About us

Trust for Nature is a not-for-profit organisation that works to protect native plants and wildlife in cooperation with private landowners. The Trust was established in 1972 to provide a way for people to donate money or land to protect native vegetation that is found on private properties across the State. We have since evolved into one of Victoria's primary private land conservation organisations, with several tools to help people protect biodiversity on their land.

Trust for Nature is Victoria's dedicated private land conservation organisation. Created in 1972 under the *Victorian Conservation Trust Act 1972 (Vic)*, Trust for Nature has a proud history of working across the government, not-for profit and private sectors to achieve permanent protection of almost 100,000 hectares of important conservation land across Victoria. Our staff are dedicated professionals with a strong focus on values. As a result, we have a culture that supports and inspires conservation achievement and personal development, both within the workplace and beyond. As a founding member of the Australian Land Conservation Alliance, and an active member of the International Land Conservation Network, Trust for Nature takes a leading role on both the national and international stage to develop and promote initiatives that benefit private land conservation.

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About the role

This role is integral to the delivery of Trust for Nature's projects in the North East Area. Reporting to the Area Manager, and working with key internal and external stakeholders, the Project Manager manages a small team to deliver strategic projects across the North East Area. The role delivers, monitors and evaluates projects that achieve strategic biodiversity outcomes and support Trust for Nature's organisational objectives.

The Project Manager role requires familiarity with conservation and land management principles, as well as Victoria's Ecological Vegetation Classes, flora and fauna. It requires people management experience, project management experience including scoping projects, managing budgets, spatial mapping skills, and delivering quality outcomes on time. It requires excellent written and verbal communication, attention to detail, the ability to liaise with many different stakeholders, including the ability to manage conflict.

Depending on the scale and complexity of projects being delivered in the North East Area, the number of projects to oversee, and the number of project staff to manage will vary. In situations where few projects are being delivered, the Project Manager will deliver the on-ground components of projects. In situations where many large scale and complex projects are being delivered, the Project Manager may oversee more staff who will deliver the on-ground components of projects.

Key Responsibilities

The primary responsibilities involve project management in the North East Area including:

- **Staff management:** Direct supervision of the area project staff, providing guidance, motivation, and direction to ensure the effective delivery of projects within the area.
- Accountability and frameworks: manage project staff to deliver multiple projects concurrently, including
 providing guidance for others in the area.
- **Communication:** prepares project reports, or oversees staff who develop project reports, requiring in depth analysis of project outcomes relevant to scope, budget and timeframes, risks and issues.
- **Knowledge and proficiency:** Apply knowledge of key conservation and land management principles to project delivery in the area.
- Policy and projects: manages project budgets, or oversees staff who manages project budgets, and
 allocates resources to ensure successful delivery of multiple projects in an area concurrently. Where
 requested by Area Managers, provides input on scoping projects to Director of Development, Chief
 Conservation Scientist, and Statewide Operations Manager.
- Administration and corporate support: Manages project budgets, or oversees staff who manages
 project budgets, and prepares reports for projects in area of responsibility including spatial mapping of
 project activities for reporting.
- Operational service delivery: Supports Area Manager by providing expert advice on conservation and land
 management practices and principles. Manages key project relationships with funding partners including
 catchment management authorities. Oversees contractor management for projects delivered in the area.
- Occupational health and safety: Promote a safety culture in the team and ensure compliance with the OHS Management System.

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Knowledge and Experience

- Demonstrated experience supporting staff to deliver projects.
- Demonstrated project management experience, including managing risks and budgets, and writing reports.
- Excellent written and verbal communication skills including writing reports and communicating project outcomes to multiple audiences via a range of techniques (e.g. presentations, reports).
- Understanding of conservation principles and practices, including legislation, and knowledge of Victorian Ecological Vegetation Classes, flora and fauna.
- Experience working autonomously and as part of a team to deliver high quality projects and conservation outcomes.
- Demonstrated experience building stakeholder relationships with agency partners, Traditional Owners, conservation organisations, and community groups.

Key Selection Criteria

- Degree in environmental science, natural resource management, or similar, or relevant experience.
- At least 5 years of experience working in the environmental sector.
- Demonstrated knowledge and experience relevant to this role.
