

Protect your land forever with a conservation covenant

For over 50 years, Trust for Nature has worked in partnership with private landholders to protect Victoria's unique plants and animals and the diverse habitats they need to survive.

What is a conservation covenant?

A conservation covenant is a voluntary, legal agreement made between a landholder and Trust for Nature. It permanently protects and conserves private land with natural, cultural or scientific values. Conservation covenants are entered into under the Victorian Conservation Trust Act (1972), and registered on title, making them legally binding forever, even when the property changes hands. By working with Trust for Nature to permanently protect private land, you can help contribute to conserving the South East Coastal Ranges priority place.

Trust for Nature is seeking landholders with properties within the South East Coastal Ranges priority place (see map below), who want to permanently protect the native habitat and the ecological values on their land. Properties larger than 40 ha may be eligible to receive an incentive payment of \$1000 per hectare (up to \$20,000). 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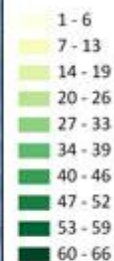


South East Coastal Ranges Priority Place
